**INDIVIDUAL AND FAMILY ASSISTANCE**

**COBRA**

**Description:** COBRA gives workers who lose their jobs, and thus their health benefits, the right to purchase group health coverage provided by the plan under certain circumstances. If the employer continues to offer a group health plan, the employee and his/her family can retain their group health coverage for up to 18 months by paying group rates. ARRA treats assistance eligible individuals who pay 35 percent of their COBRA premium as having paid the full amount. The premium reduction (65 percent of the full premium) is reimbursable to the employer, insurer or health plan as a credit against certain employment taxes. If the credit amount is greater than the taxes due, the Secretary of the Treasury will directly reimburse the employer, insurer or plan for the excess.

**Who is eligible to apply:** Individuals and their family members who have lost employment will receive an application in the mail, which they must fill out by the deadline. Eligible individuals have lost employment between September 1, 2008 and December 21, 2009. Federal COBRA is available for up to 18 months after job loss, and eligible applicants pay 35 percent of their premium. Cal-COBRA, the state plan, allows eligible individuals who have completed their 18 months of COBRA to continue coverage for another 18 months.

**CHILD CARE DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT**

**Description:** Provides a temporary increase to states to provide subsidized child care services for low-income families and to improve the quality and supply of child care for all families. A minimum of four percent of CCDF funds must be used to improve the quality of child care and offer additional services to parents, such as resource and referral counseling regarding the selection of appropriate child care providers to meet their child's needs. To improve the health and safety of available child care, many States have provided training, grants and loans to providers, improved monitoring, compensation projects, and other innovative programs.

**Funding Mechanism:** State claims funds based on expenditures for child care-related activities. Increases funds for subsidized child care programs; includes no supplant provision; appears to augment the Discretionary portion of existing grant to states. It is unclear whether funds may be used for administration. This grant targets \$255.186 million for quality improvement of which \$93.587 million is reserved for quality improvement of infant and toddler care. This amount is in addition to the requirement that states use 4 percent of Child Care and Development Funds for quality improvement.

### **COMMODITY ASSISTANCE PROGRAM - Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP)**

**Description:** Provides funding to increase the number of low-income families that would be eligible to receive assistance through The Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP) agencies. TEFAP is a federal program that provides commodities to low-income families by distributing those foods to food banks and pantries. The increased funding is for both commodities and the distribution of these commodities.

**Funding Mechanism:** Formula allocation to state; state passes through funds and commodities to local agencies for local food pantries and soup kitchens. The amount of commodities provided by the USDA is based on economic need, as determined by the unemployment index and the U.S. Census population.

## **COMMUNITY SERVICES BLOCK GRANT**

**Description:** Provides assistance to local community action agencies to alleviate the causes and conditions of poverty in communities. Funds are to be used to provide services and activities addressing employment, education, better use of available income, housing, nutrition, emergency services and/or health.

**Funding Mechanism:** States pass through funds to counties, which in turn pass through funds to local community action agencies. States may retain 5% for administrative costs. Funds would be directed to eligible community action agencies and expected to remain available until September 30, 2010. Under the stimulus package, at least 1% of a state's allocation shall be dedicated for activities relating to the identification and enrollment of eligible individuals and families in federal, state and local benefit programs. Nationally, \$1B would be provided in FFY 2009.

## **EMERGENCY FOOD AND SHELTER**

**Description:** Provides funding to help local community organizations provide food, shelter and support services to the nation's hungry, homeless, and people in economic crisis. Funds include

one-month utility payments to prevent service cut-off as well as a one-month rent or mortgage assistance to prevent evictions or help people leave shelters.

**Funding Mechanism:** Funds are distributed by formula based on unemployment and poverty rates. Funded agencies, known as "Local Recipient Organizations", use EFSP supplemental funds for mass shelter, mass feeding, food distribution through food pantries and food banks, one-month utility payments to prevent service cut-off, and one-month rent/mortgage assistance to prevent evictions or assist people leaving shelters to establish stable living conditions.

**Eligible Entities:** The [National Board](#) uses a formula involving population, poverty, and unemployment data to determine the eligibility of a civil jurisdiction. There is no national application process. Poverty data is from the 2000 decennial census (source: [U.S. Bureau of the Census](#)); unemployment data is from the [Bureau of Labor Statistics](#). Poverty figures from the 2000 census were used in Phase 27 and for ARRA funding.

### **SPECIAL SUPPLEMENTAL NUTRITION PROGRAM - Women, Infants, and Children (WIC)**

**Description:** Provides funding to increase the number of WIC participants who receive supplemental nutritional support should cost or caseload exceed budget estimates. WIC benefits include supplemental nutritious foods, nutrition education and the support of breastfeeding.

**Funding Mechanism:** The majority of the funds will be held in reserve with the federal agency and allocated as the USDA Secretary deems necessary. The USDA has received \$500 million for the WIC program, \$400 million is to go to the federal Secretary of Agriculture to be placed in the contingency reserve fund and used as deemed necessary. The remaining \$100 million is to go to states as a formula grant for implementing or upgrading management information systems.

### **TEMPORARY ASSISTANCE TO NEEDY FAMILIES (TANF)**

**Description:** Creates an emergency contingency fund for states with increased expenses due to increases in caseloads in TANF programs, including basic assistance, non-recurrent short-term benefits and subsidized employment.

**Funding Mechanism:** W-2 agencies report expenditures to states. States submit to the federal government claim for 80% of increased expenditures. Would provide additional funds for FFY 2009 and 2010 to states with 1) caseload increases, 2) increased expenditures for non- recurring short term benefits, and/or 3) increased expenditures for subsidized employment

### **PREVENTION AND WELLNESS FUND - Centers for Disease Control Immunization Program**

**Description:** Provides funding to increase the number of students who receive age-appropriate vaccinations and decrease the transmission of communicable diseases in schools. The Section 317 program provides funding for immunization operations and infrastructure necessary to implement a comprehensive immunization program at the federal, state, and local levels.

**Funding Mechanism:** Formula allocation to the state with funds distributed through DHS's current distribution network. Of the \$300 million in Recovery Act funds allocated to the Section 317 program, \$250 million will help existing Section 317 grantees acquire and make recommended vaccines available by using \$200 million of these funds for CDC-purchased vaccines that will be made available to states and territories. The remaining \$50 million will be used to provide program operation grants and scientific and technical support to states and territories to deliver the vaccines and strengthen vaccination programs. An additional approximately \$18 million in grants will be used to provide support to Section 317 grantees that demonstrate innovative approaches to increase the number of Americans who receive the childhood vaccine series, zoster vaccine, and influenza vaccine, and for improving reimbursement practices. A portion of vaccine purchase may be used to support innovative initiatives for expanding access to vaccines in schools and communities.

**Description:** Provides funding for comprehensive development services to help 110,000 additional children succeed in school. Funding will support the enrollment of additional children and families as well as create new teaching and other positions in Early Head Start programs. ### HEAD START

**Description:** Provides funding for the Head Start program, which provides grants to local public and private non-profit and for-profit agencies to provide comprehensive child development services to economically disadvantaged children and families, with a special focus on helping preschoolers develop the early reading and math skills they need to be successful in school. Head Start is a national program that promotes school readiness by enhancing the social and cognitive development of children through the provision of educational, health, nutritional, social and other services to enrolled children and families. These funds are intended to increase enrollment of additional children into Head Start and create additional teaching and other positions in Head Start.

**Funding Mechanism:** Distributed by federal government. 10% is set aside for tribes. Grantees must provide 20 percent of start up costs.

**TITLE I EDUCATION FUNDING - Title I Education for Disadvantaged Kids**

**Description:** Title I is a federal entitlement program that provides funds to school districts and schools with high numbers or high percentages of children who are disadvantaged to support supplemental educational services. Its overall purpose is to ensure that all children have a fair, equal, and significant opportunity to obtain a high-quality education and reach, at a minimum, proficiency on challenging state academic achievement standards and assessments. The grant contains provisions for ensuring that children who are disadvantaged and enrolled in private schools also benefit from the academic enrichment services funded with Title I, Part A funds. A public school district must have 2% poverty to be eligible for Title I funds.

**Funding Mechanism:** Annual public school allocations are calculated by the United States Education Department and disseminated to state education agencies. Adjustments are made to district allocations based on set asides required by No Child Left Behind. Public school districts apply for Title I Part A funds as part of a consolidated online application. Public School districts must have 2% poverty rates to receive Title I funds. Districts with at least 5% poverty are entitled to additional funds and districts with 15% are allocated yet more funds. Private schools are entitled to equitable participation in Title I Part A funds.

**TITLE I EDUCATION FUNDING - Assistance for Local School Improvement**

**Description:** The purpose of the Title I School Improvement Grants, authorized by the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001(NCLB), Title I, Section 1003(a) and (g), is to provide public school districts with additional funds and resources to help them develop and improve efforts to support Title I Schools Identified for Improvement (SIFI). Funded districts must allocate a minimum of \$50,000.00 and no more than \$500,000.00 to each Title I SIFI. Grants are renewable for two additional 1 year periods if the schools meet the goals identified in their school improvement plans. The state, in awarding such grants, must give priority to districts with the lowest performing schools and demonstrating the greatest need for funding.

**Funding Mechanism:** Discretionary grants are allocated by DPI based on the number of Title I Schools Identified for Improvement within each eligible district.
